## **Strategic Context**

- UK pesticides industry provides £0.97 bn in revenue and over 3,500 direct jobs
- Effective pest management supports £12 bn of crop production
- Pesticide use can impact nontarget species. Pollinators alone provide benefits of £630 m per year in crop production.

## **UK-EU SPS agreement**

An SPS agreement can bring direct benefits to the GB agri-food sector

- We will agree a Sanitary and Phytosanitary (SPS) Agreement to make agrifood trade with our biggest market cheaper and easier, cutting costs and red tape for British producers and retailers. This will help reduce the pressure on prices and increase choice in the shops.
- Once in force, an SPS agreement could boost UK-EU agri-food trade and add up to £5.1 billion a year to the UK economy in the long run.
- A common pesticides regulatory framework will reduce complexity for the food sector. This will remove business costs associated with duplicative approval processes.
- Expect negotiations to begin later this autumn, once the EU has secured its mandate.


#### Three key objectives:

- 2. Set clear targets and measures to monitor use of pesticides
- 3. Strengthen compliance to ensure safety and better environmental outcomes



## UK pesticides target

Target – to reduce each of the PLI metrics by at least 10% by 2030, taking figures for 2018 as a baseline

Focus on evidence-based advice to support biopesticide registration and risk assessment


#### How?

### Innovation in crop protection

Farming Innovation Programme (FIP) and Farming Equipment and Technology Fund (FETF)

- FIP: to 2030 Defra is allocating at least £200m.
- Example crop protection projects:
  - Developing a Precision Breeding Pathway via Gene Editing for Virus Yellows (FIP)
  - ARWAC targeting blackgrass with robotic weeding
  - Tractor Powered Electric Desiccator for Weed and Plant Control (FETF grants were available during 2024 & 2025 – no decision has yet been taken on a future round)
